




End-of-the-Year Banquet 12 to 3, Thursday, May 19 Springfield Golf and Country Club 8301 Old Keene Mill Road, Springfield

House before moving to the private sector. Alison has a bachelor's degree in government from the College of William & Mary and an master's degree in history from the University of Michigan.

STEMtastics

STEMtastics 2016: With the majority of the 2015 planning committee returning and an evidence-supported belief that we could inspire 300 middle school girls in 2016, the STEMtastics planning committee will organize STEMtastics again next year. Systemic Solutions has already

reserved the Ernst Center at NOVA-Annandale. We set the date as Saturday, March 12, 2016, to avoid conflicts with Fairfax County Public Schools (FCPS) spring break, Springfield Annandale's Spring Fling, and the state AAUW conference.

Committee change : Olga Burns will not be a member of the STEMtastics 2016 planning

team. She is calling it a day. As many of you know, for over two decades, Olga was the force behind Technology Futures Unlimited (TFU),



STEMtastics' predecessor event. She oversaw the entire process for many years: working with the printer, interfacing with the schools, obtaining donations, holding labeling parties, mailing forms, ordering t-shirts, scheduling girls in workshops, and coordinating event-day volunteers.

The most valuable contribution to STEMtastics that came out of TFU has been the connection with FCPS, which Olga pioneered. Without that connection, we would not have a good mechanism for directly contacting the families of so many middle school girls. In our experience, contacting girls through their schools has usually been ineffective. It is the mailing to the parents that makes the difference.

This past year Olga organized the many volunteers needed to make STEMtastics 2015 successful. In addition to the usual volunteers needed to check in students and prepare

refreshments for all, she provided additional volunteers to assist with each student workshop and guide students during the morning. Thank you, Olga; your leadership and enthusiasm will be missed.

The technology behind STEMtastics: As Olga will surely confirm, the significant difference between TFU and STEMtastics is technology.

We now obtain parent home and email addresses in electronic form. The printer uses the home address to "individually stamp" each mailer. We use the email addresses to recruit more students as well as to send reminders to those who have registered. No more affixing mailing labels to registration forms at Olga's house. But we do miss the camaraderie and good cooking.

Gone are the days of deciphering hand-written registration information and handling checks. STEMtastics has a website for registration that is linked to Paypal for payment processing. You can find the parent workshop presentations from STEMtastics 2015 at. http://mclean-va.aauw.net/stemtastics/.

Students receive evaluation forms tailored to their schedule. The girls don't have to fill in the workshop information in addition to their evaluation.

The planning committee uses old-fashioned email extensively for communicating.



From Vision to Reality

What a productive time we had at our Visioning Workshop on March 28! We would not have been nearly as successful without the help of Jeanne Elmore and Caroline Pickens, who were our facilitators, and without the space and comfort in Dianne Blais's home. The session was very constructive, and we are looking forward to the next step, which is the marketing session on April 23 at our Annual Meeting.

We started by answering five questions (see the charts posted on our website under Visioning):

- What do members care about most?
- What aspects of the AAUW mission are most important to our members?
- What branch activities support the mission?
- Are there things branch members need or want?
- What would you want the branch to do that it isn't doing now?



We then placed each answer into one of the categories listed below. Group members then voted for three categories that were most important to them. Finally, we broke into four

groups to work on an action plan related to the top four categories.

- 1. Education (13 votes)
- 2. Social (10 votes)
- 3. Branch Management (7 votes)
- 4. Advocacy (6 votes)
- 5. Fundraising (5 votes)
- 6. Membership (4 votes)

Each group then tried to put together some action items to help improve the branch. Those action items are listed in the spreadsheets also posted on the website under Visioning at http://fairfaxcity-va.aauw.net/members/ in the Member Center. (Contact the webmaster if you need the password.) These are a work in progress, of course, and input from members who could not attend (and corrections/addition from those who did) will be gratefully accepted.

One clear outcome is that we need more volunteers to work on some of the deficiencies that were identified by the group. Particularly we need a board secretary, a board public policy chair, and nominating committee volunteers. Please ask any board member about these positions if you have interest.

It's time to renew your membership for 2015–16. Dues are \$82 (\$49 national, \$15 state, \$18 branch). Our From Vision to Reality process this spring promises to reinvigorate our branch. How to Use the Membership Payment Program

1. Log-In With Your Member ID: Go to the Fairfax City Branch website, http://fairfaxcity-va.aauw.net. Scroll to AAUW Links in the right column. Click on Renew Membership. Click on

Login (top bar, next to Join.) If it's your first time, click on Register. Find your AAUW member ID on the AAUW Outlook magazine mailing label, or click on the link below the Login box to retrieve it from AAUW. Enter your member ID and password.

- 2. Access Your Personal Membership Record and Renew. Click Enter Member Services Database. Please verify your contact information and edit it if needed. In the menu on the left, click Renew My Membership. Enter your credit card information.
- **3. Submit your renewal**, verify your entries, and submit again. When you're finished,

remember to click Logout at the top of the renewal page. Look for the confirmation email.

The AAUW Fairfax City Brand

At our April branch meeting, we learned about how we can make our group more attractive to potential members. Thanks to co-presidents of AAUW of Virginia, Sandy Lawrence and Patsy Quick, for their work with our group. Through our literature, our website, our newsletter, and our conversations with nonmembers, we can do more to spread the good word about

- Who we are
- What we do
- Why they should care, and
- What we want them to do.



Sandy and Patsy had us look at the way AAUW is perceived by the general public and then how our branch would like to be known. The two are definitely not the same! With careful marketing directed to the specific audience we want to address, we should be able to change the perception of AAUW. Using the four guiding principles for stellar messaging, we can put forward an appealing self-portrait:

 Grab their attention first. You have only a brief time to get your audience to read your whole flyer or listen closely to your 30-second description of the group.

- 2. Focus on what *they* need and want. Use "you" to guarantee that you're talking to your audience.
- 3. Represent your branch brand. Include an idea of something the branch does.
- 4. Images are powerful; make them count. Use photographs of people in action, rather than static clip art, for example.



Solving the Equation

How do you explain the fact that since 1990 women's participation in careers in engineering has barely improved and in computer sciences and mathematics fields it has actually dropped, while their choice of careers in the biological, chemical, and materials sciences has noticeably increased?



This is the question explored in AAUW's latest research publication, Solving the Equation: The Variables for Women's Success in Engineering and Computing. The research team dug into the existing literature on factors that might contribute to the underrepresentation of women in engineering and computer fields, analyzed data, and conducted interviews. The

factors that seem to make a difference are outlined below.

- Gender stereotypes and biases
 consistently underestimate
 mathematical abilities of women. In
 addition, "stereotype threat" serves to
 decrease women's performance in math
 when they become afraid that they will
 confirm the negative stereotype of their
 aptitude in math.
- **Social relevance** is given a high priority
 - among women choosing careers. Their preference is to work with and help other people; jobs in engineering and computer science are not perceived as providing opportunities to improve societal well-being and work in a collegial atmosphere.
- A sense of belonging is often missing, according to women in engineering and computing fields. They don't feel they are a "good fit" with their chosen career.
- The college and workplace environments feel uncomfortable to women. Freshman computer science courses often assume a level of expertise that first-year women have not attained. This discourages some



students from the start. Women who have left jobs in engineering and computing had few opportunities for career development, little encouragement for creating job-home balance, and little support on the job.

The report includes a lengthy list of recommendations regarding these four variables. They are addressed to educators, employers, men and women in the workforce, policy makers, parents, and girls. Hunting Ground

Dianne Blais may have been our only member to see *Hunting Ground* at GMU in April. Falls Church AAUW covered \$200 of the cost of the showing and had a table with AAUW literature. The movie is a documentary about the problem of sexual assaults on campuses. Not only are the assaults frequently unreported, but even when they are, the perpetrators seldom face punishment.

The movie begins by showing how excited girls and their families are about getting into their desired college. A student then discusses how she was raped at the University of North Carolina in her first few weeks on campus. Other students describe their assaults. The stats in the film are scary. The film points out the reluctance of schools to prosecute the offenders, to discuss the role of alcohol and



underage drinking, and to acknowledge the role of sports (particularly football) and fraternities.

The movie's focus is on two girls who successfully used Title IX to highlight the magnitude of the problem so that future victims will not be alone and ignored as they were.
